The intercultural church – a cautionary tale in three acts

Act One: People across the church enthusiastically support The United Church of Canada's intercultural commitment.

Act Two: Locally, people report that they are on their way to becoming an intercultural community. They feel they are participating in the intercultural journey and express openness to intercultural initiatives.

Act Three: Things take a turn for the worse upon exploring the realm of personal perspectives and experiences. Lip service is sometimes paid to the intercultural church, many are not comfortable with "difference," discrimination exists, and feeling "safe" in the church is not always a given for marginalized people.



Online survey of 704 United Church people, including both lay people and ministry personnel

Sample generated through social media, UCC e-newsletters, *Observer* advertising and word of mouth

Questionnaire available in both English and French

Fieldwork – January 29 to March 4, 2019




To give the people of the church an opportunity to describe their experiences of and attitudes toward the church's commitment to becoming intercultural

To provide a window on the challenges and opportunities that may exist as the church works toward implementing its intercultural vision and strategy





People from different types of communities of faith






D10B. In which of the following languages does your community of faith typically worship?














D1B. In what part of the world did you spend most, or all, of your childhood?




