

John Calvin



John Calvin (1509–1564) was a second-generation leader of the Reformation, born about a quarter century after both Martin Luther and Ulrich Zwingli. But it is Calvin's work and leadership in Geneva that enabled the Reformed tradition to spread over much of Europe during his lifetime and subsequently to become a worldwide movement.

The "Reformed tradition" includes denominations such as Presbyterian, Christian Reformed, and Congregational. Through these denominations,

"united" churches such as The United Church of Canada have been strongly influenced by the Reformed tradition and see themselves as part of it.

What are the things we in the contemporary church particularly owe to John Calvin?

- Calvin not only gave a central place to scripture but also provided a compelling theological rationale for doing so.
- His key work, *Institutes of the Christian Religion*, provided a thorough theological outline of the Reformed tradition and functioned as such into the 20th century. Further, Calvin demonstrated how the key points of theology (or doctrine) he outlined in the *Institutes* had their basis in scripture. For Calvin, all theology should have its basis in scripture.
- Calvin was not a biblical literalist. But he did believe that through the reading of scripture and its explication in a sermon, the Holy Spirit can help us hear God's Word for us, in our time and place. His notion of the Bible as a means for us to receive a living Word, as a set of texts that can speak anew to every generation, continues to be our understanding.
